**A) DCG Philanthropic Services Inc.**

Stephanie Hughes with DCG Philanthropic Services Inc presented a summary of the recent Feasibility Study they recently completed. DCG met with approximately 46 Stakeholders which included Business Owners, Service Groups, Government and Individuals. Martensville’s Vision “A Great Place...” was shared with the various Stakeholders during the interview process. It was noted that many feel a Multi-Purpose Facility is a missing link to making the community even better. A need for a second ice surface was identified as extremely important, as well as the need for sports fields and multi-purpose rooms to make it a facility everyone could enjoy. Some concerns were raised during the Feasibility Study such as how will the City afford a facility like this, will the City be making a significant financial commitment, who will run the facility? DCG had some recommendations for Council to consider. A Business Plan has been identified as an important piece of the project, as well as drafting a Gift Policy, finding a Lead Chair Person to lead the campaign and finally determining the location. If City Council decides to move forward on the project DCG had identified the Campaign as running for approximately 18 months and DCG will assist with this process. Mayor Muench thanked Stephanie and DCG for all their work up to this point.

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City Council has asked Administration to bring forward a recommendation for the next Regular Council meeting for City Council to consider.

Re: Township Road 384 Paving Project

Township Road 384 is a major corridor that services the Cities of Warman and Martensville and the Rural Municipality of Corman Park. The current gravel road surface spans a distance of 1.5 miles, connecting the two cities from the east border of Martensville and Highway 11 on the south end of Warman. The roadway has daily traffic volumes in excess of 600 vehicles, and has been identified as a long term growth corridor in the P4G Region.

As has been previously discussed, Corman Park would like to undertake a project to pave this roadway in order to provide a higher level of service to users of the road. The current gravel structure is no longer adequate to withstand the traffic levels, with the only solution being to upgrade to a paved road. As this roadway is utilized by high numbers of urban residents, along with area rural ratepayers, it is proposed that the project be completed based on a 1/3, 1/3, 1/3 split between the City of Warman, City of Martensville, and the RM of Corman Park.

The estimated cost to upgrade the roadway is \$3,200,000, including all engineering dollars. Corman Park has made significant investment into design of the roadway, which is not proposed to be recouped by partnering municipalities. The RM has also made application for grant funding through the Municipal Roads for the Economy Program (MREP), which could potentially provide \$750,000 of funding to the project. With funding, the cost for each municipality would be reduced to a total of \$816,667.

The road project involves widening and paving of the existing roadway, and would be built to a primary weight standard in order to ensure that it meets current and future needs of the region. Corman Park would be responsible for construction management, and all future maintenance and capital requirements for the road while within our jurisdiction.

As a part of the most recent Martensville boundary alteration it was agreed that the City would commit to a 1/3 share of the project, subject to being involved in a design process, which we fully support. We are formally requesting that Martensville City Council allocate funds in their 2019 budget to contribute to this project that will benefit the entire region.





On October 9, 2018, a moratorium on the relocation of liquor store permits in Saskatchewan was lifted. This allows companies or individuals to buy out an existing liquor retailer and replace it with an entirely new liquor store within the same community. In many cases, these new liquor stores will be owned by large, private companies. In your community, there are three permits that could be converted into a large liquor retailer.

There are already reports that major companies are buying out small off-sales, intending to replace them with much larger full-line liquor stores.

Currently, there are 657 liquor retail permittees in Saskatchewan, each of whom is now available to sell out to any interested buyer. The provincial government has suggested in recent media reports that even more could become available in the near future. We firmly believe that large liquor retailers' main motivation is profit, and they often do not consider the societal harms an over influx of alcohol in a community can cause.

If you are concerned about the effect that these changes to liquor retailing could have on your community, there are two primary ways a municipality can restrict or oppose the proliferation of these stores.

These options have been reviewed and provided by legal counsel for SGEU.

### **Objection to a Permit**

Where a retail store is sold, the purchaser is required to apply for a new permit. Before that permit may be issued, according to the Alcohol and Gaming Regulation Act, the applicant must give notice of its application, in a newspaper published in the community, over a two-week period.

Any person(s) is entitled to file a written objection to a permit application during that two-week period. The objection must clearly state the grounds for objecting, and the objector bears the onus of establishing that a permit should not be granted. A permit may be denied based on any reason other than competition within the beverage alcohol industry. The factors involved in granting permits include the suitability of premises and the character of the applicant.

October 30, 2018

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When an objection is filed, the Liquor and Gaming Licensing Commission may hold a hearing to decide whether to grant a permit. These hearings are open to the public, and offer an opportunity for applicants and objectors to speak. With the permission of the Commission, you may be able to participate in a hearing even if you have not filed a written objection.

### **Zoning in Your Community**

A city or municipality has the authority, under Section 8 of either the Cities Act or the Municipalities Act, to pass bylaws governing businesses, including retail liquor stores. Among other types of restrictions, a city or municipality may:

- Divide businesses, including retail liquor stores, into different classes;
- Determine whether a class of business, including a class of retail liquor store, is entitled to operate at all, or limit the number of businesses in that class;
- Regulate the proximity of retail liquor stores to one another or to other types of buildings; and
- Specify the terms and conditions which a development permit for a retail liquor store location will be granted or refused.

A bylaw may be passed by a city or municipality at any time, and will have the effect of governing the future development of retail liquor stores.

We trust you will find this information useful, should you, as a council, decide to consider objecting to, or limiting the proliferation of large full-line alcohol retailers in your community.
