DELEGATIONS

A) Preferred Choice Development Strategies

Preferred Choice Development Strategies was chosen to work on a Seniors Affordable Housing and Care Project Functional Plan for the City of Martensville. The plan consists of five phases: Community Stakeholders Engagement, Market Need and Demand Assessment, Market Seniors Housing Need and Demand Demographic Supplement, Feasibility Assessment and Business Plan Framework. It has been determined there is a strong need across the housing continuum for a combination of market, entry level, seniors housing and care homes, along with the development of affordable and seniors housing through the proposed Martensville Housing Corporation Project. The City of Martensville’s next step is to have the Seniors Committee meet with James Leier in the coming weeks to further discuss the findings and plan on how to proceed.

Mayor Muench thanked Leier for his presentation.

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B) North Ridge Developments

David Calyniuk with North Ridge Developments presented to City Council a complete Concept Plan and conceptual land-use plan for the area north of the existing Lake Vista neighbourhood. The plan was designed on five fundamental principles:

- a) An inter-connected roadway system which integrated the City's existing roadways.
- b) A variety of housing types and development is provided for all market segments.
- c) An inter-connected network of walking paths and green space.
- d) Connectivity and Integration with the existing Lake Vista Neighbourhood and its land users.
- e) A continuation of the existing theme and vision of Lake Vista.

North Ridge is requesting City Council to approve the concept plan so future work can continue. A report will be brought back to a future Council meeting for formal approval.

Mayor Muench thanked Calyniuk for his presentation.

C) Saskatoon Kart Racers

Back in January 2018, City Council approved the following motion "That we approve the requested extension of 5 years providing the capital improvements are completed during the 2018 construction season and further that, the lease rate of \$750 per year be accepted for the extra 5 years". Darnell Kuzek President of the Saskatoon Kart Racers spoke to City Council regarding the 2018 motion and indicated that due to timing and weather the upgrades were not able to be completed in 2018. Saskatoon Kart Racers has secured a contractor that places them first on the list to get the work completed early this spring. Kuzek is requesting that Council reconsider the motion and allow the work to be completed this year and the 5-year extension remain in place.

Mayor Muench indicated the request would be discussed later in the meeting and a decision would be made.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

A) RFD – JointWater/Wastewater Project -WPHI Upgrades

Back in 2015 the City applied for funding for the construction of a new waterline, wastewater line, pump station upgrades and lagoon upgrades through the New Build Canada Fund. A few road bumps delayed the approval until an agreement was reached with SaskWater and the Crown Investment Corporations to satisfy the concerns that were raised. The first phase of the project has been designed and engineered which includes substantial mechanical and building upgrades to Water Pump House 1 and communication and control upgrades at the other pump stations. The project has been tendered by Catterall and Wright and the low bid was submitted by Haid Construction in the amount of \$1.73 million. The project will be funded through reserves and the City will then apply back to the Federal Government to get 2/3 of the cost back.

City Council was in favour of the upgrades and a motion was passed.

B) RFD – Main Street Median

The portion of Main Street between Centennial Drive and 1st Ave is scheduled for a full depth rehabilitation this season. During the project the current concrete median will need to be removed to facilitate removal and replacement of the failed sub-base structure. City Council is being asked if they have a preference on the type of median that is put back in. The options include a cast-in-place concrete median (like is currently in place) or with a series of movable jersey barriers (similar to medians on Centennial Drive at 3rd Street North). City Council requested Director Gruza investigate all options available to improve the flow of traffic and water. Once further information is gathered a report will be brought back to Council for further discussion and decision.

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C) RFD – Saskatoon Kart Racers

Director of Recreation and Community Services reviewed with City Council the history of the Lease Extension request and what was adopted last year and what is being requested this year. It was recommended that City Council approve the request as the work is scheduled for the upcoming weeks as long as the weather cooperates. It was suggested to include a deadline date of June 30, 2019 for the work to be completed by.

City Council was in favour of the request and a motion was passed.

D) Memo – Agreement Letter

Stephanie Hughes, with DCG Philanthropic Services Inc., has drafted a Gift Agreement letter that will be used when the Martensville Community Recreation Project (MCRP) accepts a gift from a donor and a tax receipt is being issued. The draft includes potential recognition that can be offered, based on the donor recognition chart. The template will be customized for each large donor identifying the type of gift and recognition options. The City of Martensville will be a signee on the agreement as the party responsible for recognition approved and accepted. The agreement clearly outlines the City’s role in approving naming rights. City Council is being asked to approve the draft letter and authorize the City Manager to sign all Gift Letters on behalf of the City of Martensville. By authorizing the City Manager to sign these agreements it will not delay the process. All agreements will be shared with City Council but can be signed prior to a Regular Council meeting.

Dear Martensville Township,

This letter is to alert you to Bill C-68, another piece of interventionist federal legislation that will have a negative impact on your municipality, and on the property rights of your ratepayers.

Bill C-68, which is currently before the Senate, reverses changes to the Fisheries Act – changes which municipalities similar to yours requested our previous Conservative government to make.

Specifically, we amended the "HADD" provisions of the Act, (Harmful Alteration Disruption or Destruction of fish habitat).

One of the most significant problems identified by municipalities about the HADD provision was its broad application and restrictive nature, which ended up costing property taxpayers thousands of dollars, with no real or apparent benefit to the environment.

Municipalities which needed to install culverts or other flood mitigation work were in too many cases faced with negative enforcement after work was completed, with inconsistent guidance when they sought direction for compliance.

In addition to repealing our amendments, the current Federal Government has expanded the definition of "habitat," and added a new concept to the Act, "water flow."

By explicitly adding in the concept of water flow, which was not in the old legislation, the scope of offences municipalities can be charged with, have been greatly expanded.

Worst of all, rather than specifically listing what is and is not an offence under this legislation, including fines or jail, this power has been handed over to the unelected technocrats, to determine by regulation, what the penalties for non-compliance will be, after they have determined what is non-compliance.

As the longest consecutive serving Conservative MP in Ontario, representing a predominantly rural riding, I am very aware of the challenges rural and small-town municipalities have faced dealing with the Federal government.

Clear regulatory certainty is necessary to prevent the return of conflicted interpretations, and inconsistencies in enforcement of the Fisheries Act which happened in the past.
